On Monday 29 February 2016, students, guests and NCW Vic members came to the Legislative Council Committee Room, Parliament of Victoria, to present awards from the 2015 program and to talk about the 2016 *My Vote My Voice* theme.

Our host the Hon. Bruce Atkinson, President of Legislative Council, spoke to open the event and spoke about struggle for recognition of the right to vote and to stand for local government in Victoria. It was and it is challenging for women standing for local council. However, we can see now that there are more women elected to council and there will be even more in the future.

NCW Victoria Youth Adviser, Sarah Morgan, introduced students who were there to receive *NCWV Civic and Citizenship Awards* as individuals and school teams. Victoria Waid (Academy of Mary Immaculate), Diya John (St Monica's College in 2015, now at Mac.Robertson Girls High School) and Rachel Rockman from Methodist Ladies College were individual awardees; and University High School, Melbourne Girls' Grammar School and Ruyton Girls' College were school awardees.

It was also exciting to hear from a young MP Joshua Bull, Member for Sunbury. He congratulated the 2015 Awardees and presented the *Civic and Citizenship Award* certificates and envelopes to the students and schools. Victoria Waid now a law student responded on behalf of the Award recipients.

After refreshments Diya John was part of the panel and talked about how she became a more confident speaker. Diya was a lead speaker at the 2015 '*My Vote My Voice*' Beijing +20 event. She is now heading to New York for a week for this year's meeting of the UN Commission on Status of Women thanks to the assistance of NCW.

Other speakers on the panel were Cr Coral Ross, President of Australia Local Government Women's Association, Dr Deborah Towns, University of Melbourne, and Pam Hammond, NCW Victoria. The 2016 theme is *Women in Local Government: Past, present, future.*

Honourable Healers: Pioneering Women Doctors:

In mid-nineteenth century, women were expected to remain at home, as wives and mothers. In Britain, the United States and Australia, teaching was the only respectable profession for women; even nursing was frowned upon. In this environment, three remarkable women rewrote the history books by becoming doctors in a world where women were not even allowed to vote. Elizabeth Blackwell, Elizabeth Garrett Anderson and Constance Stone are three women whose stories are told by Dr Merrilyn Murnane, whose book was published in September 2015, Australian Scholarly Publishing.RRP \$39.95

Dr Merrilyn Murnane AM, MBBS, FRACP, FACLM, DCH, DDU, is a retired paediatrician living in Melbourne. She attended the Presbyterian Ladies' College in Melbourne before graduating from the University of Melbourne in 1960. After completing her residency at Prince Henry's Hospital she trained at London's Great Ormond Street Hospital for Children. Upon returning to Melbourne, she was appointed paediatric registrar and later consultant at the Queen Victoria Memorial Hospital, and subsequently at the Monash Medical Centre, where she established the child protection unit. For her services to paediatrics she was honoured as a member of the Order of Australia in 2003. Upon retirement Merrilyn began working with communities in Papua New Guinea, initially assisting children with disabilities and now also funding scholarships for young women to study nursing, medicine and teaching. With her husband Max Griffiths, she has established a mobile health unit in the East Sepik Province.

Vanuatu is an archipelagic nation of 83 islands, extending over 1000 kilometres in a north-south direction between the equator and the tropic of Capricorn. It lies some 2000 kilometres to the northeast of Brisbane in the Coral Sea, at similar latitudes to Cairns in North Queensland. The population of Vanuatu is approximately 263,000. Port Vila, on the island of Efate, is the capital. Formerly known as the New Hebrides, Vanuatu was jointly governed by British and French administrations before attaining independence on 30 July 1980. Australia has a close relationship with Vanuatu and is an important economic partner, providing the country with the majority of its tourists, foreign direct investment and aid. Australia is Vanuatu's largest bilateral aid donor. The estimated Australian aid budget for Vanuatu for financial year 2015-16 is \$60.5 million.

Violence against women and children is widespread in Vanuatu with 60 per cent¹ of women experiencing physical and/or sexual violence by an intimate partner in their life time. Through Pacific Women Shaping Pacific Development (*Pacific Women*), Australia has provided \$800,000 to the Vanuatu Women's Centre (VWC) to prevent violence against women through provision of safe-house costs, expansion of services and research on violence against women. Support is also provided to the Centre to work with the Division of Women's Affairs to implement and monitor the Family Protection Act. Merylin Tahi, Coordinator of the Vanuatu Women's Centre and Kathy Solomon, Executive Director, Vanuatu National Council of Women, talked recently about the situation for women in Vanuatu on ABC Radio. Merilyn said *I'd like to see men and women have equal footing in decisions at home, the workplace and government. In Vanuatu, boys are preferred over women for education. I'd like to see that stop.* Kathy responded *We are now including men as much as possible in workshops that we think are relevant to them. It's tricky because only targeting men would be a problem also. We haven't addressed gender issues seriously in Vanuatu but we are looking at addressing it more seriously in the future. Also we need to include an approach that includes the whole family - mothers, fathers and children.* <u>http://www.abc.net.au/ra/carvingout/issues/women.htm</u>

Shepparton Festival - Artist in Residence - Shepp Train Project (Report from Barbara Brown)

'Be Consumed' by this amazing three-week practice based arts residency that creates a transient space for participating artists to document the shifting terrain on the service from Shepparton to Southern Cross Station daily. Local artists including the Textile Collective will explore social and cultural conditions of place through their chosen medium, individual memory and personal experience. The Textile Collective, a group of 15 local women, will be rostered in 2's or 3's on the scheduled Shepparton trains from March 5 - March 19 demonstrating their craft. After arriving at Southern Cross they will set up a temporary studio on or near Platform 1 or 2. This will give other travellers the opportunity to view their work and have a chat.

This is an amazing project and I hope some of our rural regional members coming in or out of the city or for any members that use the Southern Cross Station between March 5 - March 19 will find time to look around for studio. There may be other artists as well but I don't have their details. Nor do I have the exact details of the time they will spend each day at Southern Cross so please keep an eye out for them and say 'hello'. They will be only too delighted with your support and the opportunity to have a chat about the group and their work.

Standing Committees/Advisers (May Hu, Coordinator)

The 15 February SC/Advisers meeting was held as part of visit to the office of Ellen Sandell MP (Member for Melbourne). Thirteen attended and were briefed by senior adviser, Alice Bleby, on role of a local member, and the work of the office. Next meeting is at Ross House on 19 April.

The 2016 May forum was discussed. One question is how best to arrange access for members to the forum: possibly hold the forum twice, once in the CBD and again somewhere else in the suburbs, or repeat at a late afternoon time; feed-back from some member organizations is that cannot attend daytime meetings The 2016 forum will look at implementation of the National Disability Insurance Scheme in Victoria.

Nevertheless, this is seriously concerning news because YPA has occupied a prime position in young artist development in this country ever since it started seven decades ago. It has been the backbone in launching the careers of many of Australia's most outstanding musicians such as Brett Dean, Julian Smiles, Duncan Gifford, Howard Penny and Roger Woodward ... More recent winners include Amy Dickson, Kristian Winther and Sophie Rowell.

NCW Victoria new working group 'Conversations about Civics and Citizenship'

First session Thursday 3 March, from 10 to 11.30 a.m. This was an opportunity to review the Australian Government publication, <u>Australian Citizenship: Our Common Bond</u> and to discuss what new citizens actually know about Australian laws. Since 2007, more than 650,000 people have taken Australia's computer-based citizenship test and most passed. Becoming an Australian Citizen requires an individual to swear or affirm *From this time forward, under God, * I pledge my loyalty to Australia and its people, whose democratic beliefs I share, whose rights and liberties I respect, and whose laws I will uphold and obey.(*optional wording, an affirmation is an alternative).*

The Australian Institute of Health and Welfare has released a new report on 25 February 2016:

Health status and risk factors of Australians with disability 2007-08 and 2011-12 This report examines how health-related factors affect the health status of Australians with disability at the national population level.

- In 2011-12, half (51%) of people aged 15-64 with severe or profound disability reported poor or fair health, compared with 6% for those without disability.
- Half (50%) of people aged under 65 with severe or profound disability had mental health conditions, compared with 8% for those without disability.
- Higher proportions of people aged 15-64 with severe or profound disability compared with those without disability were obese (43% versus 25%), doing no physical exercise (46% versus 31%), daily smokers (31% versus 15%) and having a very high level of psychological distress (22% versus 1%).
