#### From the President:

This December marks the 70<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of The Universal Declaration of Human Rights, adopted by the UN General Assembly on 10 December 1948. I take this opportunity to wish you a joyous and safe Festive Season. I look forward to working with you next year. I hope to welcome you to the Australia Day Pioneer Women's Ceremony, Monday 21st January 2019, at the Women's Peace Garden Kensington; it is a magical place.

**Quote: UN Article 2.** Everyone is entitled to all the rights and freedoms set forth in this Declaration, without distinction of any kind, such as race, colour, sex, language, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status. Furthermore, no distinction shall be made on the basis of the political, jurisdictional or international status of the country or territory to which a person belongs, whether it be independent, trust, non-self-governing or under any other limitation of sovereignty.

#### **Speaker at November Council Meeting:**

Debra Saffrey-Collins, Head of the Chaplaincy team at the Brotherhood of St Laurence (BSL), the first woman and the first lay person to do so in the history of the BSL. Her role is particularly in the care of the staff and volunteers (1200) of the agency, now numbering 2500 people. Debra explained that the BSL is a welfare agency of the Anglican Church. It was started in 1930 by Priest Gerard Tucker, who wanted to develop a broad religious community. Throughout its nearly ninety years the BSL has sought to make a difference where disadvantage is most keenly experienced. She said 1 in 7 children are in poverty, many young people living on \$2.90 per day.

Gerard became a chaplain while serving in WWI and buried 100s, collecting their possessions and writing to families. On his return, joined with Guy Cox and Michael Clark to form the beginnings of BSL. After WWII it grew to the BSL, the multi-faith organisation we know. He advocated for the poor and created a film on the reality of poor parts of Melbourne that resulted in housing redevelopment. He was also appalled by the lack of Government support for those affected by floods in India. This was the start of Community Aid Abroad.

He lobbied GJ Coles to donate to the development of

Carrum Downs housing for residents of city slums.

The BSL programs and services support disadvantaged people of all ages to build better lives for themselves. The aim is to develop innovative services that are often adopted by community organisations and governments. They aim to have no poverty in Australia (financial, emotional). They are involved in the Early Years, owning Kinders/Child Care and running the HIPPY program with parents and children learning English and parenting skills, many then becoming tutors. BSL supports Refugees and Asylum seekers; give financial support, including superannuation advice, to women and others; NDIS; also they have Aged and Dementia facilities. Social cohesion and sense of community is the continuing focus.

#### 58<sup>th</sup> Australia Day Pioneer Women's Ceremony:

This event will be held on Monday 21st January in the Women's Peace Garden, Epsom Road Kensington, 10:00 for 10:30am start, finishing at around 11:30am. The garden was designed with the 'peace' symbol and the 'female' symbol. Bluestone pavers form a circle with a Y inside to create a peace sign in the grass. The circle joins at a + symbol created by the shelter to form the female symbol. This park was built on the old Newmarket saleyards which closed in the 1980s, after which they were developed into medium density housing. The heritage of the area has been remembered with many of the old peppercorn trees also the bluestone paths and post and rail fences. The garden was built in 1986 to commemorate the International Year of Peace. It was designed by a team of women, including Eleanor Sumner, with plants chosen to fit with the colours of the Women's Movement and to symbolise remembrance.

The Lord Mayor of Melbourne, the Right Honourable Sally Capp will be the speaker.

Guest Speaker was Roslyn Rogers OAM, founder of KOGO. (Knit One Give One). Ros qualified as a pharmacist in 1974. She learnt to knit as an eight year old and never lost the passion for this activity. In 2004, prompted by a very cold winter, Ros decided to combine her passion for knitting with her love of helping people and started KOGO in order to distribute warm winter hand knits to people in need. From its humble beginnings of 180 scarves that first year, KOGO has grown into the major organisation that it is today, with over 5000 volunteer knitters across Australia. This year KOGO has distributed over 84,000 warm winter woollies through over 250 community groups to the most vulnerable in our community and this year it is well on its way to setting a new record. The KOGO volunteer knitters make a whole range of items – including scarves, beanies, blankets, toys, children's and babies' clothing. In 2017 Ros was awarded a Medal of the Order of Australia for her work in setting up KOGO.

# A Women's Museum – an Australian first - Visibility equals voice; Visibility equals respect

Her Place Women's Museum Australia has warmly welcomed the announcement of the establishment of a national Women's Museum at Clarendon Terrace, and the \$1 million grant from the State Government to the National Trust. "This is an Australian first and a huge milestone for Australian women," said Mary Delahunty, Her Place Director and Treasurer, who was at Clarendon Place when the then Minister for Women, the Hon Natalie Hutchins MP, made the announcement. "Australian women can look to the future by examining – and celebrating – our past. Our stories, so often neglected or disregarded, will finally have 'a room of their own' - in fact, two whole floors of the beautiful Clarendon Terrace in East Melbourne, and a digital outreach. "We invite everyone to come but, of course, we hold special hopes that young women and girls will be inspired by what they discover by women who have gone before. The museum, as well as collecting and telling stories, and holding artefacts and archives, will deliver dynamic educational programs for teachers and students and host topical public events." Delahunty said more financial support would be necessary. "Her Place has a home, but we will still need more support to make Her Place's vision a reality. We now invite the generous support of women, and all those who support women and gender equality, to become involved to ensure our stories are told, and to help advance the status of women throughout Australia," Her Place Board Chair, Mary Stuart, who was overseas said, that a women's museum is an idea whose time had well and truly come. "Over the past three years, with some seeding funding from The Victorian Government, and a lot of hard work from volunteers and a few very part-time staff, Her Place has delivered ten exhibitions – four in Melbourne and six in regional Victoria. They've attracted thousands of people," Stuart said.
