From the President, Elisabeth Newman

This is a perfect segue to our Annual student event in the Parliament of Victoria on 19 August 9:15am-12:30pm: *My Vote My Voice – Male and Female Youth as Future Voters.* See below for details and application form.

In Canberra recently, I met the President of NCW ACT, Juanita Flet, to talk about homeless older women and shelters, an issue of great concern to NCWV and the ACT Council. Juinita asked me to look into portable housing.

Having been invited to take part in the preparations for the Beijing+25 review to take place at CSW64 next March, I will be joining preparatory teleconferences, when able. Asia Pacific Women's Watch (APWW), a large voluntary activism network based in the Asia and Pacific Region, which monitors and collaborates with the United Nations, national governments and NGOs in empowering women and advancing their human rights, is coordinating the preparations in the Asia Pacific region. Headed by Carole Shaw, Australian NGOs are encouraged to assist with the response to the Federal Government's report looking at the gains, challenges and suggested actions for each of the 12 critical areas contained within Beijing Platform for Action (BPfA). I have taken a small part in the five yearly reviews - 2000, 2005, 2010 & 2015 since the 1995 declaration of the BPfA. The United Nations NGO CSW has guidelines to follow in preparing the parallel Reports. Planning is taking place around the world. ECICW (ICW-CIF's European Council) members, following their meeting, will be attending the UNECE Conference focusing on Beijing +25 to be held (October 29-30) in Geneva.

September will be the A.G.M. Notices will be circulated shortly with all relevant paperwork such as nomination forms for the Committee. All positions will be declared vacant. I look forward to seeing you and please encourage the President of your respective organisation to attend. Refreshments will be served following the meeting.

<u>The Asia-Pacific Regional Council (APRC)</u>: Hean Bee Wee, President of APRC, with the NCW of India and the Pune National Council, has been organising the next meeting of the Regional Council which is to be held in Pune on 9th Nov with the General Assembly of NCW India on Nov.10th. It is with sadness that we report the death of **Beryle Frances Campbell Foster, OAM**, a long-time member of NCWV. A gracious, smartly dressed lady, always had smile and, with a social conscience, was always willing to assist NCWV. Elisabeth came to know Beryle, when in the late 1980s/early 90s the Associates (Individual Members) commissioned her, daughter Robyn and Elisabeth to research the plight of Outworkers. In 1995 Elisabeth was questioned about their findings by a Federal Senate Select Committee. Beryle was born in Burwood NSW in 1926. She served in the WAF - Women's Air Force 1944-1946, then married Tom Campbell and had six children including twins and a stillborn. Their son (twin) was tragically killed in his teens. They moved to Swan Hill and conducted a family business.

Beryl joined as a member of NCWV Murray Valley (Swan Hill) Branch c.1967. The branch supported her nomination for City of Swan Hill Council and she was elected as the first woman councillor for City of Swan Hill 1969-1972. She moved to Strathmore in Melbourne and married Eric Foster. She reconnected with NCWV as an Associate member in 1986, attending associate and council meetings up until 2015. Her NCWV positions - 1990 Voting Associate Proxy; 1991 Voting Associate 1991-1992-1993; Associate Delegate to NCWV Executive 1994-1995; Note Taker Associate Meetings 1996; Proxy for Associates Convenor 1997 - 2003/04; First proxy for Associates. Whilst on NCWV EXECUTIVE, Beryl was a member Finance Comm. 1993; member Functions/Fundraising Comm. 1993. In 1994 Beryle with NCWV member the late Alice Teague accompanied the then NCWV President Janet Galley OAM to Swan Hill to reactivate the Branch. At the Swan Hill City Council Civic Reception Beryl and Alice knew most guests and the admiration and respect for them was evidence that their time in Swan Hill had been valued and appreciated. She was a member of the League of Women Voters and the Penguin Club. She will be long remembered and missed.



We also acknowledged the death of **Heather Jean Low** - former Delegate for Graduate Association Institute of Early Childhood Education from 1976 to 1994. She was a Member of the Education Standing Committee, 1978-1987. Heather was appointed Life Governor in 1983 for more than 60 years of service to Ivanhoe Girls' Grammar School and was a life member of Ivanhoe Girls' Old Grammarians Association.

Patricia became a NCWV delegate of Firbank Old Grammarians Association in 1996 and is still a delegate for FOGA, attending and contributing to Council meetings regularly. She joined the Executive in 2009 and has held many positions in NCWV. These include as Adviser on Youth, Child and Family 2003-2005, Adviser on Habitat 2006-2007 and Adviser on the Environment 2008-2011, 2019-. In this role she was diligent in research, informing members monthly about the state of the environment and actions that could be taken to improve the situation. Pat held the role of National Adviser on the Environment 2003 - 2010.

These roles required regular reports to

the Standing Committee, as well as Annual reports to NCWV and to National Council of Women of Australia (NCWA). She has also sent submissions to the Parliament of Vic. on environmental issues, one being an expose on energy options and their ramifications. Patricia is an active and passionate member of the Bayside Friends of the Environment and St Andrew's Anglican Church, Brighton, roles she shared with her husband George, now deceased.


Dr Deborah Towns OAM



Dr Deborah Towns is the NCWV delegate for and President of the League of Women Voters. She is the National and NCWV Employment and Economic Adviser. Deborah is a sociologist, historian, author, researcher and Associate, Centre for Workplace Leadership, Business & Economics, University of Melbourne. She has a range of experience in consulting, project management, professional development, and teaching in workplaces, universities and schools. She has expertise in the analysis of gender and leadership in workplaces and schools.

She was joint author with Dr John Andrews (2018) 'A Secondary Education For All?' A History of State Secondary Schooling in Victoria. Other publications included women and leadership, sexism in schools, diversity and work

At the July late afternoon meeting the speaker was Lucy Skelton, Melbourne Girls' College, Richmond.



Lucy was a speaker at the My Vote My Voice event in 2018. She spoke well on the theme of Diversity in Community Workplaces. She is the 17 year old founder of the Student Voice Network (www.svn-au.com), which is a free platform for Australian students to share resources, meet like-minded youth and come together to take collective action on issues that are important to them. She is best known for her work as a One Girl Ambassador on Earth Echo International's Youth Leadership Council, and for her commitment to sustainability. She is looking forward to seeing how SVN can support the amazing work that NCWV is doing.

She spoke about a World Vision Conference that she attended and was inspired to create a platform for young people to connect and share issues for which they wanted to take action, including climate change, refugee issues and homelessness. Her mantra was "If you feel passionate about an issue, don't wait for others to act – do it!" The reflection time at the end enabled her to encourage others to join her. Many did! This enabled emails to be collected and create the Network. These were used to spread the word by forwarding to others. People were encouraged to share issues for which they were passionate and determine action that could occur. They hold video conferences on a weekly basis to discuss issues that are important to members. They have an Advisory Council, the members of whom mentor Lucy and others; they have community support; and coordinate with World Vision and other organisations. Lucy would like to know the best way of linking with NCWV to encourage young participation.
